# THE GATHERING OF THE COMMUNITY

A candle is lit. An invocation of a commemoration, memorial or feast may be noted. Bell x 3

#### **Gathering Words**

O God, open our lips. And our mouth shall proclaim your praise. Glory to you Source of All being, Eternal Word and Holy Spirit. As it was in the Beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end, Amen.

### <u>Gratitude</u>

Night has passed and the day lies open before. Let us pray with one heart and mind...

a brief silence is kept.

As we rejoice in the gift of this new day, so may the light of your presence, O God, set our hearts on fire with love for you.

In silence, or aloud, we name that for which we are grateful this morning.

### **Confession and Assurance**

We human beings have sinned against God, each other and creation. Let us ask for forgiveness... We take a moment to offer up what we have done or left undone individually or collectively - to God's unceasing grace and mercy...

Silence is kept for confession. An assurance of grace or absolution is offered.

# THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

#### The Psalm

*The psalm of the day is said or chanted from the psalter.* ...Glory to You, Source of all being, eternal Word and Holy Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end, Amen.

**The Reading** A reading of the day is read aloud – usually the appointed gospel.

### The Contemplative Sit

#### The Principles of Centering Prayer

1. Choose a sacred word or a sacred breath as the symbol of your intention to consent to God's presence and action within.

2. Sitting comfortably and with eyes closed, settle briefly and silently introduce the sacred word as the symbol of your consent to God's presence and action within.

3. When engaged with your thoughts, return ever-so- gently to the sacred word. Thoughts include body sensations, feelings, images, and reflections.

4. At the end of the prayer period, remain in silence with eyes closed for a couple of minutes.

The 20-minute silence begins and ends with a bell. At the end we may bow toward each other.

### The Canticle: Hannah's Song

We may chant or speak Hannah's Song together.

My heart exults in the Lord;  $\blacklozenge$ 1 my strength is exalted in my God. My mouth derides my enemies,  $\blacklozenge$ because I rejoice in your salvation. There is no Holy One like you, O Lord, • 3 nor any Rock like you, our God. For you are a God of knowledge  $\blacklozenge$ 4 and by you our actions are weighed. The bows of the mighty are broken,  $\blacklozenge$ 5 but the feeble gird on strength. Those who were full now hire themselves out for bread, ♦ 6 but those who were hungry are well fed. The barren woman has borne sevenfold, • 7 but she who has many children is forlorn. Both the poor and the rich are of your making; • you bring low and you also exalt. You raise up the poor from the dust, • 9 and lift the needy from the ash heap. 10 You make them sit with the rulers • and inherit a place of honour. 11 For the pillars of the earth are yours ♦ and on them you have set the world. <u>A)</u> We offer praise to Jesus, a Palestinian Jew,

born to a woman in poverty in a time of social upheaval

and political oppression. Jesus knew human joy and sorrow. So filled with the Holy Spirit was he that in him people experienced the presence of God among them. We sing praise to God incarnate. Jesus announced the coming of God's reign—a commonwealth not of domination

but of peace, justice, and reconciliation. Jesus healed the sick and fed the hungry. Jesus forgave sins and freed those held captive by all manner of demonic powers. He crossed barriers of race, class, culture, and gender. He preached and practised unconditional love—love of God, love of neighbour, love of friend, love of enemy and he commanded his followers to love one another as he had loved them. Because his witness to love was threatening, those exercising power sought to silence Jesus. He suffered abandonment and betrayal,

state-sanctioned torture and execution. Jesus was crucified. But death was not the last word. God raised Jesus from death, turning sorrow into joy, despair into hope. We sing of Jesus raised from the dead. We sing hallelujah. By becoming flesh in Jesus, God makes all things new. B) In Jesus' life, teaching, and self-offering, God empowers us to live in love. In Jesus' crucifixion, God bears the sin, grief, and suffering of the world. In Jesus' resurrection, God overcomes death. Nothing separates us from the love of God. The Risen Christ lives today, present to us and the source of our hope. In response to who Jesus was and to all he did and taught, to his life, death, and resurrection, and to his continuing presence with us through the Spirit, we celebrate him as the Word made flesh, the one in whom God and humanity are perfectly joined, the transformation of our lives, the Christ. <u>Advent I</u> God of justice and peace, from the heavens you rain down mercy and kindness. Raise our heads in expectation, so that we may yearn for the coming day of the Lord and stand without blame before your Son, Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns for ever and ever. **Amen.** Revised Common Lectionary Prayers (2002) alt.

<u>Advent II</u> God of timeless grace, you fill us with joyful expectation: make us ready for the message that prepares the way, so that with uprightness of heart and holy joy we may eagerly await the coming of your Son, Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. **Amen.** Revised Common Lectionary Prayers (2002) alt.

<u>Advent III</u> God who winnows the wheat from the chaff: let the fire of your Spirit purge us of greed and deceit, so that, purified, we may find our peace in you and you may delight in us. Grant this through him whose coming is certain and who day draws near, Jesus, the Lord of the harvest. **Amen.** Opening Prayers (1997) alt.

<u>Advent IV</u> O God of Elizabeth and Mary, you visited your servants with news of the world's redemption in the coming of the Lord. May our hearts leap with joy and our mouths be filled with songs of praise to welcome the Christ in our midst. **Amen.** Revised Common Lectionary Prayers (2002) alt.
